Look to the Future

"And I bought the field of Hanameel my uncle's son, that was in Anathoth, weighed him the money, even seventeen shekels of silver. And I subscribed the evidence, and sealed it, and took witnesses, and weighed him the money in the balances... For saith the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel; Houses and fields and vineyards shall be possessed again in this land." (Jer. 32:9-10, 15)



Faith in the presence of trials or difficulties is not as easy as faith in the times of ease. It is easier to trust the Lord when there is peace in the Land and the economy is strong. But that is not the time when faith has the greatest impact nor calls for the greatest strength and courage. Joshua was called of God to lead Israel into the "promised land," but in the first chapter of Joshua, the Lord exhorts Joshua to be "strong and of good courage" three times.

Jeremiah surely does not live in a time of ease and comfort. Verse 2 of chapter 32 tells us that Babylon was besigning the city of Jerusalem. Fear was in every heart and in the very air they breathed. They did not have the army to defeat Babylon, and the walls of Jerusalem would withstand an onslaught for only so long. Then there was the fear of starvation. Food supplies would get scarce after several months and as in Solomon's day when people even resorted to eating their babies for food.

Now was not the time to make plans for the distant future. Daily survival was the thing that filled the minds of individuals. In fact, certain possessions became expendable in order to gain money so they could afford to pay the higher costs of food. A field outside the walls of the city where the Babylonians camped was absolutely worthless if one feared that they would not live.

This is the situation that pervaded the city of Jerusalem. It was in these dire circumstances that Hanameel the son of Shallum, Jeremiah's nephew came and asked Jeremiah to buy his families field in Anathoth. Anathoth was outside the city walls and Hanameel saw no prophet in a land that cannot benefit him now. Fear of death and fear of the troubles around him caused him to consider selling all he had so that he could survive today.

The desperation of Hanameel becomes most evident when you learn that Jeremiah was in prison in Jerusalem. Evidently, none of his other relatives would even consider buying a field that they thought they would never Continued page 5

Jonathan and his father were shepherds just like his family had been for centuries—not just ordinary shepherds but shepherds who watched over the temple lambs—"those without spot or wrinkle." But, he knew he could be a good shepherd like King David.

"Let's count the sheep and get them settled for the night," father reminded him on this night. Jonathan obediently nudged the lambs with the end of a sixfoot staff.

WHAT IF YOU ARE WRONG ABOUT ISLAM?

I have before me a copy of the Quran. I am not an expert in this subject but have learned in an extensive study of hermeneutics to be able to recognize true meaning in all languages by the normal use of language rules.

This book clearly says that any Muslim who is friendly with a Jew, Christian, or other infidel is to be killed. They might pretend to be friendly, but those people are obligated to kill the infidels when the time comes, or else they themselves are to be killed. The lie about a peaceful religion will not stand, even if you are referring to those who are peaceful at the moment. The Quran clearly identifies Islam as a religion of terror. Do your own study, read it for yourself. (3:151; 8:12; 8:60; 33:26; 59:2; 59:13)

Read what happens to someone who converts to another religion or someone who will not convert to Islam. Converts are won, and they are kept - by fear, hate, violence and intimidation. Read about cruelty and torture. Read about the abuse of women, dismemberment, beheading, and horrible treatment of infidels. This is the majority of Islam, because that is the law. If you can read this and still think it is a religion of peace, you deserve what is coming to this country.

COMPARE THIS

If I witness to you about your need for salvation in Christ and you refuse it, you go on your way to face God alone in judgment. You need have no fear of me because of your rejection. If, however, you are offered the choice of conversion to Islam and you refuse, no matter who you are, you are an infidel, and that person is commanded to kill you. In Islam, the sons are sent out to commit suicide and kill as many people as they can. In Biblical Christianity, God sent His Son to die on the cross so that many sons could live.

Those who claim peace for the majority of Islam must know very little about the history of this religion. They must know very little about what Muslims are commanded to do. They must not be reading about the brutal killing of Christians every day in this world by the Muslim majority. I was told yesterday that hundreds of believers are killed every week by majority Muslims. They must not know about the burning, beheading, drowning, beating, and death published in the news on a daily basis.

To blaspheme, mock, or speak ill of the Quran will get you the death penalty. On the other hand, Islam can reject and make fun of Christianity, and that is fine. What if you are wrong about Islam? I can tell you that you are wrong if you haven't taken time to study why the majority of this religion is not peaceful. include the word "kingdom". It is used by many who seem to think it is some kind of magic wand. The truth is they have no idea what "kingdom" they are even talking about! "Similarities are not equal", and the Bible describes a number of kingdoms. The use of cute little phrases is simply nonsense. People talk about "building, growing, enhancing, or strengthening the kingdom". Which kingdom is that? God has made it clear that He alone is in charge of His kingdoms. God will build all of His kingdoms. He may use us to help in some minute action, and we may act as servants, but we are not building His kingdoms. When did God die and leave prideful man in charge?

To add insult to injury, in addition to taking credit for what God is doing, men have the gall to defend their views, ideas, opinions, and interpretations. Those human conclusions are irrelevant. There is only one true idea, the one that God has stated clearly in the Bible text before men began to insert their own ideas. Our speech definitely betrays us.

One more illustration is the use of the word "holiness". Holiness is the sovereign possession of a holy God. We have no holiness and cannot beg, borrow, or steal it. God alone is holy, and if any of His holiness is in my life, it is because God dwells within each believer. Any holiness that flows in or out of my life is totally God's working through this earthly frame; I am not the source or the owner.

For the self-centered person, this looks like a matter of splitting hairs. The truth is that this religious cancer is destroying many of the young bucks in ministry today. The younger generation is enamored with false intellect. The purveyors of error - often scholars - poison young minds by their use of words that hide real meaning. What they are reading and following is obvious because "their speech betrays them". Watch for the "buzz words" that are used in order to make one sound so much like the "in crowd". In their youth and inexperience, they fail to ask about the theology behind the verbiage. Their heads and hearts have been turned from the scriptures, where the answers really lie - turned instead to those who have hidden truth behind their terminology and speech. But that is a topic for another day...

see again. So Jeremiah is the last hope. Hanameel is desperate because of the fear of the present circumstances that he is willing to sell the heritage he received from his father and was responsible to pass down to the next generation. He saw no future and he saw no prospect of hope. All he could see was the Babylonian army. All he heard was fear in the hearts of people around him. And all he could think about was one option, "sell what I cannot use today even though it means there is no future prosperity or inheritance for the next generation."

It must have seemed odd to Jeremiah that the Lord would come and tell him to buy the field from Hanameel even before Hanameel had come to offer it to him, (32:6-9). If the field is useless to Hanameel in the city, it is even more useless to the prophet in the prison in the city. But God had revealed this to Jeremiah that it was indeed the will of the LORD. So Jeremiah obeyed. He paid the price Hanameel asked for the land. He signed the deed of transfer, and Hanameel went away thinking that the old prophet was bonkers. He had pulled one over on the old coot and he now had the money needed to get the best of the food for him and his family and survive the present crisis. He must have seemed very wise in his own eyes.

Jeremiah gave all the documents of transfer and the deed to Baruch to put in a clay jar and hide it so that the evidence would be available to those who would need it in the future. Yes, you heard me right. Jeremiah was thinking of the future. This prophet looked at the very same circumstances that all the others saw and he bought the field instead of selling. They tell us that those who are the wise investors buy in times of great difficulty because they are preparing for the future when there will again be prosperity.

What made the difference? God had spoken to Jeremiah. Jeremiah was listening to God and saw the hand of God. God had told him that Hanameel would come and when he did, Jeremiah knew that God had a plan for the future. The present trials always seem very bleak. We can be overwhelmed by physical trials that cause us to stop serving. We can feel distressed by financial concerns that we do not see a way of escaping or overcoming. We may be beset with personal attacks that make it seen as though there is no one who can help and cause you to feel all alone. Whatever the trial, there is a God in heaven that has the answer and power to meet every need. It was "human" to fear the circumstances. All the citizens of Jerusalem were doing and saying the same thing. They saw the Babylonians encamped around the city and they saw only one possible way of acting and thinking. But when everyone is giving up and fearing the circumstances, that is the time when we must look up to see the eternal God and obey Him.

God had told Jeremiah that "Houses and fields and vineyards shall be possessed again in this land," (32:15). There may seem to be many obstacles set in our way, but the Lord is greater than them all. He is looking for men and women who will look up to Him and OBEY Him. Jeremiah just didn't say that I believe God can do great things. He had to put his money, his hope for the future to demonstrate that faith. Obedience is the response of faith.

If there ever was a day when the church is being pressured to give up, it is today. There are many small churches that are beginning to wonder what the future holds. They do not see many visitors and they don't come back. It is easy to pull back and just try to survive and save all we can. But pulling back does not advance the cause of Christ. Worshipping within the walls of the church building does not reach the lost who are outside. The future is outside and we must believe God who has the power to break the hardest heart. We can say we believe God can win the lost, but He has commanded us to go with the gospel to the lost and trust Him in obedience. His Word will not return void.

Governmental pressures seem to squeeze the church and put fear into the hearts of believers as if God cannot change things. Our God was able to exalt Daniel even when the other princes conspired against him and it looked like the lions were going to have a feast and the wicked princes a party.

Buy a field when there is no food and no way to get to the field? Trust God when it seems hard to win someone to Christ? Trust God when finances are tight and take the need to Him? These are not just things that we do when things are tight, these are things of faith that we do because our God is the ALL POWERFUL GOD OF CREATION.

I challenge you to put faith to work through your witness. Put faith to work in your giving. Put faith to work in your prayers. Put faith to work in your obedience to the work and will of God.
