THE RECIPE

If you didn't know how to make
a cake, where would you start? A
recipe or a mix where you just fol-

low the directions. But, would the directions make sense? How much is a cup of water—what size cup? What kind of oil? Eggs—would you know what to do with eggs if you had never seen an egg? Throw in the whole egg? Worse yet, what if the recipe calls for egg whites? How do you do that? What does it mean to sift, cream and mix? How do you grease and flour a pan? Do the instructions mean really 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees? How do you know when the cake is done?

Almost every woman has a disaster story regarding baking? Ever make a chocolate cream pie from scratch (with a recipe) and leave out the sugar? I did! Ever set the oven timer to bake the Sunday dinner while you're at church and when you come home the timer didn't work? I did. The dinner was not ready, and our guests were two pastors.

On the other hand, would any of this matter if you had nothing to feed your family? It could be a matter of life and death—perhaps your last meal. It is then that a recipe wouldn't matter. As if there seems to be no hope, what if a starving beggar appears at your door asking for food?

The Widow of Zarepath, one of my favorite unnamed women in the Old Testament, was such a woman. (I Kings?) After a 3.5 year drought, which was a judgment from God, all she had was enough grain and oil to bake one little cake for her and one for her son. Then like hundreds of her townspeople, they would die of starvation. But she couldn't turn this beggar away when he asked for a drink of water and a little cake. "Bring me a little water in a vessel, that I may drink," and, "Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand" (verses 11–12). Some of us wouldn't blame her if she turned him away. Not meaning to

As I started out, I was doing great. I made a left turn, right turn, left turn, always keeping the sun on my left side because it was early afternoon. As long as I did that, I knew I was heading north and would eventually reach I-80 way ahead of schedule and be on my way to the conference.

I was kind of brimming with confidence heading up the road in my old red pickup truck feeling a little bit like a red neck. You know how it is when you try to do something that people say you can't and you are doing it. Like when you are playing basketball and you feel you can't miss, or when you step up to bat and you know you're going to get a hit, or when you go to preach and you feel a good sermon coming on. Whether it ends that way or not is another story. I'm sure we have all felt that confidence sometime in our experiences.

So I was motoring along making a left turn, following a road then a right turn following the next road getting closer and closer to I-80. Then it happened! I was on this road, when I happened to be talking to my daughter expressing how well I was doing. I went from a country road to a gravel road to a logging road. I knew it definitely was not the on ramp to I-80. I finally came to a dead end. You know there ought to be a law on roads that are dead ends. They should be made to put a sign that says "dead end" or "no outlet." But that's not the half of it. It was what I was looking at that frustrated me more. I had dead ended at the Clarion River.

I sat there in my red pickup truck and stared for a minute or so and said to myself, "David, you should know better. You're a western Pennsylvania boy, and you knew that the Clarion River would be between Sugar Creek Rest Home and I-80." I made the mistake of forgetting that I would have to navigate my way past the Clarion River. I had only two choices to make at that time. One, I couldn't do and the other, I didn't want to do being an A to B guy. I could back up and take a run for it and jump the Clarion River in my red truck. The problem is I would have to jump 50 yards at least. That was not an option. So I started my way back the logging road muttering to myself that there should have been a dead end sign at the main road, blaming others like we all do at times. Funny thing when I worked my way back to the main road, I went a little farther and caught the bridge over the Clarion River and soon after hit the on ramp to I-80 where I wanted to go. I was so close yet so far away.

Then it hit me. This experience was much like my journey in life and in the ministry. We start out young with great confidence in life and the ministry. We have different goals and different ways to get there. We work and we toil then one day we grow old, and we find ourselves facing the Clarion River, the end of our life and ministry. Eventually we have to cross the Clarion River one way or another. We haven't become the well-known preacher that people said we would be. We have smaller congregations than we thought we would. Some people actually fall asleep when we preach. (Just to let you know, they do that with preachers of large churches too.) You have never written that book and if you have you have sold three copies. Aren't you glad for family? As if you're just living life and when you get to the Clarion River you feel unfulfilled and frustrated.

In real life you can't back up and retrace your steps and back up the years. Life is a one-way street. So what's my point? If you're reading this, you haven't come to the Clarion River yet. I'm not sure if I had Google on my phone for directions, it would have been a big help. Spiritually in my journey, I don't think I can handle my journey without a heavenly navigator. You'll find it at "theword.com." ^"Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths" (Proverbs 3:5,6). We all know it, but it's hard to not lean unto our own

understanding when we come to those difficult crossroads or our flesh gets in the way and our human confidence gets out of hand. It is very important that we take some time and recalculate our direction and motives on this journey before it is too late.

To those of you that are young in life and the ministry, it's hard to think about the Clarion River. It seems so far away. But it's the best time to evaluate how you want to get where you want to go or where God wants you to go. Bigger is not always better. Being famous may even be a dangerous thing for you, even locally famous.

I was sitting on a platform with a young preacher, and he leaned over to me and said, "Let's make God famous." That's a statement that will lock you into a heavenly due north and keep you on the right road. I've never forgotten that statement and it has helped me at many crossroads where self gets in the way.

Those of us that are older, there is always time to examine our journey and check our motives before we reach the Clarion River. I believe in the "greatness of an ordinary life" as one preacher put it "grace for the grind", just like I was trying to take the back roads to get where I was going. It was a simple thing but important thing to me. It's not important to God how important we are. It's more important to Him that we take our life's journey by the direction He gives us, humbly do the tasks that He wants us to do even if it is tasks that others don't want to do. We know we have taken some wrong roads when we become bitter or burnt out and feeling our labor has been in vain and our words have fallen on deaf ears.

Korah in Numbers 16 somehow got on the wrong road. As a Levite he didn't get a wagon of goods after the battle because they were busy with the tabernacle. Korah's job was to move the furniture wherever Israel was to move in the wilderness. Pack and unpack. I'm sure it was a tedious job, but God cared for their every need.

He was angry and got some of the princes of Israel to side with him against Moses. It was what Moses said to Korah that showed he may have been doing the right thing (moving furniture) but for the wrong motive. Moses put it into perspective when he said, "Seemeth it but a small thing unto you, that the God of Israel hath separated you from the congregation of Israel, to bring you near to himself to do the service of the tabernacle of the Lord, and to stand before the congregation to minister unto them" (Numbers 16:9)?

I meet many people in life and ministry who feel like I did, frustrated when I dead ended at the Clarion River. Pastor Colas taught me that a lot of preachers know how to get on the train when they preach, but the secret is to know when to get off. So I will make this simple. God has a different journey for each one of us, some the high roads, some the low roads, some the back roads. First, we can't make this journey without heavenly navigation. "The Morning Meet" (Psalm 5:3) Part 1

Psalm 5, is considered to be "The Morning Psalm." I believe that the third verse gives direction to the whole of this Psalm: "My voice shalt thou hear in the morning, O LORD; in the morning will I direct my prayer unto thee, and will look up" (5:3). So, the Psalmist is saying that in the morning, we can start each day: seeking God's face (vss. 1-3); seeing God's righteousness (vss. 4-6); standing in God's strength (vss. 7-10); and, sharing God's joy (vss. 11, 12).

As verse three indicates, King David, the writer, intended to begin his day with God. Thus, daily, in the morning, David desired to be heard (vss. 1-3); in the morning, David longed to be holy (vss. 4-7); in the morning, David prayed to be helped (vss. 8-10); and, in the morning, David asked to be happy (vss. 11-12).

I believe the point of this Psalm, supported by other passages of scriptures, is that while we should be in contact with the Lord moment by moment throughout the course of the day, it is vitally important that we get a good start with our Lord in the morning. So, how is your "morning meet" with the Lord? My burden is that many are defeated as Christians because we do not have, like David, that solid resolve to come daily before the Lord and meet with our God. The old hymn probes with this question:

"Did You Think to Pray?" 1) Ere you left your room this morning, Did you think to pray? In the name of Christ our Savior, Did you sue for loving favor, As a shield today? **Refrain:** Oh, how praying rests the weary! Prayer will change the night to day; So when life seems dark and dreary, Don't forget to pray. 2) When you met with great temptation, Did you think to pray? By His dying love and merit, Did you claim the Holy Spirit As your guide and stay? 3) When your heart was filled with anger, Did you think to pray? Did you plead for grace, my brother, That you might forgive another Who had crossed your way? 4) When sore trials came upon you. Did you think to pray? When your soul was bowed in sorrow, Balm of Gilead did you borrow At the gates of day? (Author, Mary A. Kidder) Morning-Continued 7

We might think we have good reasons not to do so. One is that we are too busy. Think of that, too busy to daily fellowship with the Lord through prayer! There are examples of great saints of God that we read about in the Scriptures and we read of in Church history. They were not too busy to pray! In fact, they were too busy not to pray! This 'morning meet' was of paramount importance to them. One said, for example, said 'No Bible, no breakfast'. He continued, 'If I get up this morning and I don't have time to read my Bible, well then I don't have any breakfast until I get to that place where I'm pouring over my Bible before God and bringing my prayers to the throne of grace'.

Reformer Martin Luther, history tells us, was a very busy man. Among his many world-changing reformation activities he wrote: 'If I fail to spend two hours in prayer each morning, the devil gets the victory through the day. I've so much business I cannot get on without three hours, at times, daily in prayer'. He continued: 'If I should neglect prayer but a single day, I should lose a great deal of the fire of faith'. Luther, an hero of the faith, a man who turned Europe upside down for Christ, deemed as important a daily time of meeting with the Lord. So, in the light of his testimony, and the testimony of Scripture: have any of us lost the fire of faith, the vitality of our Christian lives, the power, the victory? Could it be that we are neglecting our personal, private time with the Lord?

In citing Luther above, a specific time allotment is **not** being suggested. And please note, I'm not talking specifically about Bible reading plans or schedules. I'm not talking about praying. We have heard plenty of discourses about praying and Bible reading in the past. I'm not even talking about what has been commonly called today 'the quiet

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Much today. That has been rejected and replaced with jeans, T-shirts, shorts and sandels. The well accepted translations were accepted, but now rejected for paraphrases and short sermonettes. And along with that it was accepted that church music would be of a higher quality and standard of worship and in preparation to the preaching of the Word of God. Not so much today. More and more churches are installing a full set of drums and several electric guitars playing worldly rock music. There are some that are darkening their auditoriums with special lighting and having fog machines to create a certain atmosphere. There is more of an emphasis on entertainment and not so much on biblical worship. We are seeing the Laodicean church in action. 8

I have said this before: some change is good, but when change draws us away from Christ and closer to the world and its looks, sounds and actions, that is not good, not good at all. Our Lord desires each of us to pursue holiness (I Pet. 1:16), seeking those things that are above and setting our affections on things above (Col. 3:1,2), making an effort to think on GOOD things (Phil. 4:8).

I am so glad that our God does not change – Jesus Christ the same yesterday, today and forever (Heb.13:8). You know, it might be good for those who are so enamored with the new to reconsider the old. be rude, she explained that she hardly had enough to make two cakes.

He was persistent and insisted that she bake him a cake first and then make two more with whatever was left over. "For thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, 'The jar of flour shall not be spent, and the jug of oil shall not be empty, until the day that the LORD sends rain upon the earth" (1 Kings 17:14). The beggar was Elisha the prophet. Did she? There might have been something about him that urged her to do what he said, or perhaps she simply believed what he had told her.

I wondered how she made them. If flour and oil were all she had, what did they taste like? They were the best food she had prepared in her lifetime. Nonetheless, as a result of her obedience, "She and her household ate for many days. The jar of flour was not spent, neither did the jug of oil become empty, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah" (verses 15–16). The widow's food supply was supernaturally extended with enough for her household. I think that included many, many of her neighbors.

Recently, I read the following and thought what a wonderful recipe for all of us to follow—one she may have followed. No culinary skills needed. "And they that know thy name will put their trust in thee: for thou LORD has not forsaken those that trust thee" (Psalm 9:10).

I believe she became a believer that day. How many others did also? Just like we would share a special recipe, let us share God's recipe: "... for whoever comes to him, will never be hungry or thirsty again."

GRACE: Psalm 34:8 "Oh, taste and see that the Lord is good! Blessed is the man who takes refuge in him!"

OBEDIENCE: 1 Corinthians 10:31 "So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God."

FAITH: Psalm 37:25 "I have been young, and now am old, yet I have not seen the righteous forsaken or his children begging for bread."

ACCEPTANCE/TRUST: Matthew 4:4 "But he answered, 'It is written, Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God."

BELIEF. John 6:35 "Jesus said to them, 'I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst.'"

time', or 'having devotions. All of these things have led people to think that to just read a portion of Scripture then pray through a list and bring your needs to God - while good, it can lead through going through the motions, just to get things done. Understand, I am suggesting meeting with God in the morning and through that, developing a life of *communion and fellowship* with our Lord Jesus Christ. "That which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may have fellowship with us: and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with his Son Jesus Christ. And these things write we unto you, that your joy may be full" (I John 1:3, 4).

Saints of God in bygone eras have called this 'Morning Meet' 'the trysting time'. This is an archaic name, an old word for a time and a place where lovers used to meet. You would arrange to meet at a special specific place with the one that you were courting. There ought to be a time, when we just meet alone with Jesus, the Lover of our souls, and to His bosom fly! Likewise, 'Morning Meet' has been otherwise known as 'the still hour' or 'the quiet hour'. A more Biblical title, 'the morning watch', comes from the Psalmist David in Psalm 5:3: 'O Lord, in the morning shalt thou hear my voice; in the morning will I order my prayer unto thee'. Whatever it might be called, it was practiced by godly individuals of all the ages. The thought was that the early morning was God's appointed time to meet Him. Robert Murray M'Cheyne put it like this: 'I ought to pray before seeing anyone. I feel it is far better to begin with God, to see His face first, to get my soul near Him before it is near another'.

Is this the current practice of the church of Jesus Christ, and of individual believers? Who or what do you meet with the first thing every day? Like M'Cheyne, do you cherish, 'To see the face of Jesus before we see any other face?' We appreciate biblical men of faith like David who said, 'Evening, and morning, and afternoon will I pray and cry aloud and seek Your face'. As well, we uphold the apostles who went up to the synagogue early in the morning to pray. Also, we see the example of our Lord Jesus who was found early in the morning in the place of prayer. We value men like M'Cheyne and Martin Luther - but as someone said concerning this, 'We build these men's tombs and write their epitaphs, but we are careful not to follow their examples!'. Do we follow their faithful examples of an early morning meeting with God?

I am **not** saying that the morning is the only time to meet with God. Individual schedules, practices, and situations may not allow for that. However, what I am proposing is, **we ought to somehow have quality time alone with God**. Allow time alone with the Lord, before the daytime distractions crowd Him completely out.

AGAIN, I'm not talking about legalism - that you must spend a certain amount of time in personal devotions. Don't put yourself into bondage, and set yourself up for failure. Rather, I'm saying, we need this unique time alone with the Lord. Once you make this a daily practice, where you really desire to meet with the Lord - it will not be a bondage, but it will be blessing. You'll see that it won't be penance, it will be a privilege to get up and every day to lift your voice to God in the morning.

A Resolution on Transparency and the Education of Our Children

Whereas Children are a gift of God to parents and are answerable directly to those parents or guardians (Psalm 127:3; Ephesians 6;1); and

Whereas parents or guardians are directly responsible for the influence and education of the children under their care (Deuteronomy 6:4-7; Proverbs 22:6); and

Whereas this responsibility to educate and nurture their children may require the assistance or delegation of certain aspects to others, this does not negate or diminish in any way a parents or guardians primary authority under God to their children (Galatians 4:1-2; 1 Kings 1:6); and

Whereas the relationship between those who educate children and those who are responsible for those children is vitally important; and

Whereas informed parents and guardians drastically improve educational outcomes; and

Whereas transparency in education assures those positive outcomes; and

Whereas transparency deters or exposes those who wish to use their delegated positions to coerce and indoctrinate students with political, social, and sexual ideologies that are contrary to a parent or guardians better judgment; and

Whereas Pennsylvania and Federal law requires schools to give parents the opportunity to review all instructional materials and have access to information about the curriculum, including academic standards to be achieved, teacher manuals, films, tapes, supplemental instructional materials, evaluations and assessment techniques (20 U.S. Code 1232h and 22 Pa Code 4.4); and

Whereas the Pennsylvania Legislature passed the Educational Transparency Act in 2021, which would have required that a portion of the materials that parents are entitled to review would be assessable on the districts website. Parents who don't have time to go to the school to sit and read would have been able to review the material from their homes; and

Whereas Governor Wolf vetoed this important legislation;

Be it, therefore, resolved that we the messengers of the PARBC, meeting on April 25-26, 2022 at Grace Baptist Church, Kittanning, Pennsylvania, do hereby emphasize the need for accountability and transparency in the delegated authority of our educational institutions;

Be it further resolved that we are grateful for our legislature passing the Educational Transparency Act;

We further encourage School Boards across the Commonwealth to update their parental review policies to provide digital access to instructional materials, and to require that any additional supplemental material a teacher gives to children which was not part of approved curriculum is immediately placed in a digital folder accessible to parents and administrators for review;

We finally resolve to pray for those given the awesome responsibility of training children; knowing that someday all will stand before the God who sees everything, and answer to Him regarding this important stewardship (Matthew 6:4-18; 1 Corinthians 4:5; Heb 4:13).

A Resolution on Gambling

Whereas Gambling has been a sinful scourge upon humanity all throughout history and is indicative of a society that is not trusting Almighty God; and

Whereas gambling has always encouraged idleness and gain without hard work and preys upon those of weak character and a poor work ethic encouraging reward with no effort; and

Whereas the Bible clearly states that good, honest work is the Lord's blessing upon man and leads to true satisfaction (Proverbs 12:14, 13:11), that the Lord desires us to work heartily unto him (Colossians 3:23) requiring us to put an honest effort forward (2 Thessalonians 3:10) and that money can never satisfy the true needs of mankind (Ecclesiastes 5:10) having no lasting value (Proverbs 23:5); and

Whereas the Bible clearly states that the love of money is the root of all evil (1 Timothy 6:10) and those who would greatly desire it welcome "...many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition" (1 Timothy 6:9); and

Whereas the Bible clearly condemns the sin of covetousness (Exodus 20:17), instructs the child of God to live a life devoid of such a selfish lifestyle (Hebrews 13:5) and warns the believer to beware of that prideful sin assuring us that our lives do not consist of that which we possess (Luke 12:15); and

Whereas the Bible instructs the believer clearly that all we have is provided by the Lord (James 1:17), that He gives us the strength to work and have what we need (Deuteronomy 8:18), that He has promised to provide all our needs (Philippians 4:19) so that we may be able to be used of the Lord to "...give to him that needeth" (Ephesians 4:28); and

Whereas the Lord desires us to live a godly life of contentment (1 Timothy 6:6) warning us that the believer cannot serve God and money (Luke 16:13) but must live a life that is completely dependent upon the Lord's provision, not focusing on the riches of this world but on spiritual riches (Matthew 6:19-24) which God alone provides;

Be it, therefore, resolved that the messengers of the Pennsylvania Association of Regular Baptist Churches meeting April 25-26, 2022, at Grace Baptist Church in Kittanning, Pennsylvania, do hereby reject and condemn gambling in all of its forms including but not limited to casinos, games of chance, sports betting, lotteries and other similar vices.

Be it also resolved that we will teach in our churches the principle of financial dependence on the Lord as well as good stewardship with what the Lord provides.



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
